No More Mogadishus

When his reelection campaign stalled in August of 1992, President George Bush Senior sent the U.S. Army into the east African nation of Somalia in a desperate attempt to garner black electoral support for his languishing candidacy. Ambassador, Jeane Kirkpatrick earlier argued in a famous essay, "...it is not within the United States'

power to democratize the world." (Jeane Kirkpatrick. "A Normal Country in a Normal Time." THE NATIONAL INTEREST, Fall, 1990.) For Islamic states to evolve into pluralistic democracies would require a miracle rivaling The Virgin Birth, with or without America's help.

For far too many decades, American politicians have used unrest in remote locales as an excuse to flex American military muscle as a virtue signal. Safely ensconced in the *Presidential Emergency Operations Center* under the White House, they were only too willing to sacrifice American blood and treasure to further their own political ambitions or to enhance their legacies.

The unwillingness of the second Trump Administration to fund Ukraine's hopeless war against Russia signals a wiser and more selective use of the U.S. Military. Likewise -- as Jeane Kirkpatrick advised -- it should be limited to those situations in which we have a vital, national interest.
